**Project description:** RBK is an immersive career accelerator (coding bootcamp) in the Middle East.

Target Population: Vulnerable youth, primarily refugees and females, in the Middle East. LGBT youth and disabled youth are also included. RBK prepares youth for industry by providing high-demand technical and soft skill training. Although RBK offers several programs, its fullstack software engineering program is the most popular and uses the world-famous Hack Reactor curriculum.

This 19-week-program is divided into two phases, Bootstrap and the Immersive. Given the high demand for the training, RBK accepts <5% of all applicants. At the end of the training road, a career fair matches graduates with several of RBK's 100+ regional hiring partners.

## **Results to-Date and/or Target Results:**

## **Interesting Features & Innovations:**

-RBK is the **first immersive bootcamp in the Arab world, and the** first refugee career accelerator in a conflict zone.

-RBK uses eXtreme Learning (XL) approach that combines several traditional methodologies and soft skill training.

-RBK tracks dozens of behavioral indicators that correlate with job and life success. Heat maps of technical strength, English, soft skills, problem solving, and emotional health are used to throttle the learning.

-\_RBK is attracting industry to the region. Witness Expedia's worldwide search for a new location and settling on Jordan primarily because RBK is producing Silicon Valley trained engineers. Expedia created 250 new jobs in Amman.

Currently RBK produces around 120 high quality, market-ready graduates per lab per year. Given the high demand for software engineers, RBK is aiming to produce 2,000 engineers per year by 2022 across MENA. 400 young people have been reached by RBK so far, and it intends to reach more than 10,000 youth in the next five years. Multiple evaluations and assessment show impact of RBK. The World Bank spent 2 months in 2018 evaluating RBK. They found RBK has become a critical link in the tech ecosystem. Graduates are being hired at 802 JD per month on average (\$1,360) – 2X university graduates. Placement rate is near 100% within 6 months compared to university rates of <10%.
